REGULAR MEETING: The regular meeting of the Oceanport Mayor and Council was called to order on March 18, 1993 at 8:00 P.M.

Councilman Terra reported with regard to the Police Report, he wanted to mention that during the month of FEBRUARY, the Dispatchers received 417 calls and wanted to commend the following officers who have successfully completed the listed courses: Sgt. Harold Sutton--At Scene Traffic Accident Investigation; Patrolman Steven Tagerty--Street Survival 93, The Tactical Edge Seminar; Patrolman Raymond Ciani, Detective Mauro Baldanza and Sergeant Harold Sutton--Bias Incident Investigations.

Councilman Terra had a copy of a letter from Monmouth Medical Center from the Security Director commending the Oceanport Police Department for their assistance during the recent snow storm of March 13 & 14, 1993. H 18, 1993

Councilman Terra also had a note from Ms. Susan Arnold commending Patrolman Ray Ciani for assistance to her during that snow storm and he offered the Council's thanks and appreciation to the entire department during that storm.

Councilman Terra advised that Chief Joyce has requested that he pass along thanks to the Public Works Department for the excellent job in plowing the snow and by Saturday all roadways in the Borough were open and passable.

Councilman Terra also had a copy of a note from Cheryl Moore of the Recreation Committee thanking those members of the Oceanport Hook & Ladder Fire Company who participated in the clean up of Old Wharf Park.

Councilman Terra then read a proclamation from Governor Florio commending all the people who helped in anyway during the storm of December 11, 1992 and stated that everyone who assisted in any way during and after this storm, were the true heroes and heroines and congratulated them all for their efforts and compassion.

COUNCILWOMAN FILIPPONE: Councilwoman Filippone reported the Oceanport First Aid Squad received 30 calls during the month of FEBRUARY; traveled 409 miles in response to these calls and contributed 293 person hours to the residents of this Borough. She commended the First Aid Squad for their fine work and commented that at their meeting last night, they had an extraordinary amount of thank you letters from the citizens of the community.

Councilwoman Filippone advised that one of the First Aid Squad members was ill, Ed Dangler and although he is not a resident of Oceanport, he is a very active member of the Oceanport First Squad and we wish him a speedy recovery.

Councilwoman Filippone reminded the residents that she will be conducting the annual Health Screening in cooperation with the First Aid Squad and the screening will be held on April 24, 1993 and pre-registration is required and will be held on April 21, 1993 from 3:30-5:00 P.M. and 7:00-8:00 P.M. and the cost will be \$25 for the Smack 23 blood test, hemmocult and urinalysis as we have done in the past and this year we are offering for men 40 years of age and older, two blood tests for prostate cancer and that will be an additional \$35 which is half the fee because these tests are very expensive, but extremely worthwhile.

COUNCILMAN MILLER: Councilman Miller reported under Shade Tree, they will be doing their annual Arbor Day sapling donation to the Wolfhill School.

Councilman Miller reported that the Shade Tree has already received requests for plantings and when the weather gets nice, we will begin that program. He also commented that we will be undertaking a creative project, that will benefit the Borough and we have a Boy Scout who will be assisting us for his Eagle Scout badge along with the Public Works Employees.

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Councilman Miller explained that we have received approval from the race track to use a plot of land next to the firehouse and we are going to clear a section and purchase 4-6 foot saplings and create our own arborarium. He continued that we will be doing this in such a way that the trees will become mature to plant over a period of time and not all at once and we will be planting somewhere in the neighborhood of 50 trees the first year and will continue each year. He also stated that this will be a great savings to the Borough over the years and will allow us to plant trees where they are needed to make our community look better and help our environment.

Councilman Miller commended the Public Works Department for their assistance in some tree trimming around the Borough.

Councilman Miller reported under the Recreation Committee, the annual Spring Egg Hunt will be held on Saturday, April 17 at Blackberry Bay Park at 9:00 A.M.
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Councilman Miller advised that the Recreation Committee sponsored a very successful bus trip to the Philadelphia Flower Show.

Councilman Miller commented that John Kerwin, Recreation Director, has been out touring the parks and has come up with a parks work list and one of the things he said was even with the storm damage, our parks are in very good shape as compared to past years.

Councilman Miller reported under Waterways, our sampling results from February 29, 1993 were the best that we have had to date and all of the coliform counts were very low and the water quality indexes were approximately good. He stated that the sampling done in Monmouth Park, which was done on February 18 by the Monmouth County Board of Health was also good and all their numbers were under 200 so now we have a base line number to start off with when the horses are back at Monmouth Park.

Councilman Miller advised that on March 31 he and Councilmen Terra and Taylor and Richard Gruskos will be participating in a Monmouth County Environmental Round Table Meeting and at this meeting we will be introduced to the County's new project, where they will divide the County into 9 Environmental Impact Regions and we are in a region that is called the North Coast Region with approximately 7-8 other towns and we will be getting together to discuss mutual concerns regarding the environment and any type of permit process which is going on in a region, we will be made aware of them by a list and we will be able to see how it relates to our environment.

Councilman Miller commented that one of our members, Bob Broege, is working on a grant possibility, through a philanthropic group in North Jersey, which would allow us to purchase equipment and do most of our sampling on the river and will give us more freedom and possibly not only providing the service for the Borough, but perhaps for any community on the Shrewsbury and possibly the Navesink Rivers.

Councilman Miller then asked the Water Watch Committee members to come forward and he and the Committee presented Mayor Cavanagh with a plaque that they received from the State Department of Environmental Protection and Energy. He stated this award is for the work that the Water Watch Committee has been doing over the past several years.

COUNCILMAN TAYLOR: Councilman Taylor congratulated Councilman Miller and the members of the Water Watch Committee on the receipt of their recent award and also to Councilman Miller for being selected as one of the Moderators for the Environmental Round Table sessions.

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Councilman Taylor reported under the Drug Alliance Committee, he wanted to advise that the Safe Homes pamphlet is in the final stage of editing and should be out within the next week.

Councilman Taylor advised that the BABES Program will begin on March 23, 1993 and he explained that this Program began last April through the Drug Alliance Committee and the grants that we received as well as in other programs. He continued that Center State was visited by our 4th Graders yesterday and he received a phone call to advise him that this was an excellent program for our students and was received well and became very involved.

Councilman Taylor reported under the Board of Education, he offered his congratulations to Danny Abbot and Lauren Chaump, Spelling Bee Champions and they will be participating over at Monmouth College. He also congratulated Beth Williams for winning the Geography Contest and she will be representing Maple Place School throughout the State.

Councilman Taylor announced the resignation of Lenny Longo from the Board of Education and thanked him for his many years of service to the Board.

Councilman Taylor congratulated Meredith Pizzuli who was chosen Student Achiever of the Year and she has been very active in our sports programs and presently serves as President of Student Government and has maintained honor roll status throughout her years at Maple Place.

Councilman Taylor announced that the Drug Alliance will be holding a meeting on March 24, 1993 at the Maple Place School at 7:30 P.M.

COUNCILMAN WOLFE: Councilman Wolfe advised that due to the December storm, many of the Borough's waterways were affected by debris and silt from the eight extremely high tides that we experienced. He continued that the County Mosquito Commission had sent us a request to have us inventory those waterways, drainage channels, ect. and if we needed work to be done, they would come out and investigate to see if the problems were storm related. He stated this past week he met with a FEMA Representative and Marty Chomsky, Commissioner of the Monmouth County Mosquito Commission and toured eight of the waterways and after the inspection, it appears that the Federal Government is going to approve the Borough's request, through the Mosquito Commission, to have these channels cleared out during the spring.

Councilman Wolfe stated that once again we were hit with another snow storm and this was the 6th one this winter and hopefully, this was the last for the 1993 snow season. He commended the Public Works Department for continually plowing during the storm and we were able to keep the roadways open and they have done a fine job working many, many long shifts.

MAYOR CAVANAGH: Mayor Cavanagh reported that last Friday we received the news that the weather department had confirmed that we were going to get hit with a blizzard and shortly after that, an announcement ran that stated Fort Monmouth had been included in the Defense Department's recommendation for base closings and realignments. He stated that the storm was handled very well from Jim Slattery, Emergency Management Coordinator to the Chief of Police, Bob Joyce, to the volunteers and we met on Friday night and everyone was aware of what might happen and what would have to be done and luckily, we did not get the blizzard that was predicted.

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Mayor Cavanagh stated the situation with the Fort Monmouth problem has not been solved and for everyone's understanding of the severity of that situation, although they are calling it a realignment, if you look at the numbers of people who will lose their jobs, he could only guess that one uses the term realignment only if you don't know the people who will be losing their jobs. He continued that if you realign the jobs to Rock Island, IL the chances of people relocating to Rock Island, IL are not good.

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Mayor Cavanagh commented that what is disconcerting to those of us who have been involved in the "Save Our Fort" committee over the past several years, is that the method by which you find out what is going to happen. He stated if you think back, the Vision 2000 Report came to Congressman Pallone by way of a fax that to this day no one knows who sent it, but the Department of Defense never informed him until after the fact. He stated that this particular announcement which was made last Friday, we were at every turn of the road, receiving no indication that Fort Monmouth was even under consideration, and in fact, neither Congressmen nor Senator Lautenberg had the slightest idea that Fort Monmouth was in jeopardy. Mayor Cavanagh stated that there is something very inappropriate about the process when the Representatives on a Federal level of the people who are going to be affected, are not given the slightest clue that this situation is being considered.

Mayor Cavanagh stated as to the merits of the decision, he is sure everyone has read that the Army's conception is that they can save 15 million dollars a year by moving but they will spend 93 million dollars to move, so for the first six years they won't save anything, which caused Mayor Cavanagh to question will it really be 93 million dollars and is that really a figure that makes sense in the overall analysis.

Mayor Cavanagh commented that those issues have yet to be determined and the Defense Department finalizes those recommendations some time in July and he wanted everyone in the Borough to know that we are obviously contesting this at every level and he is not prepared at this time to advise everyone to be optimistic because this is the furthest it has ever gone and the consequences will be severe and there will be a loss of a variety of school children in Eatontown; Tinton Falls has the high school situation as well as other problems and we face residents who will probably lose their jobs and the overall economy of Monmouth County will be debilitated by possibly as much as 3% from fallout of people who no longer have the money to spend because of the loss of jobs.

Mayor Cavanagh opened the meeting to the public for any comments or questions they might care to make.

PETITIONS FROM THE PUBLIC:

Stu Briskey, 43 Manitto Place stated on behalf of the Oceanport Fire Department thanked the members who provided a duty crew during the blizzard between the hours of 8:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M. and then from 9:00 P.M. to 1:00 A.M. a full stand by was called out and fortunately the forecast did not come through and we came out okay.

Mr. Briskey also thanked Fred Filippone for plowing Port-au-Peck Chemical Hose Fire House constantly and keeping it clear and open.

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Mr. Briskey wanted to just remind the Mayor and Council that we have had a storm watch for 12 week ends plus and the Port-au-Peck generator is still not operating, which provides fuel for all the emergency services in this Borough, including the snow plows and he would appreciate that being taken care of as soon as possible.

Councilman Clark stated he was advised Monday evening that this matter should be resolved very shortly and commented that we are going to have a 55 gallon drum placed there until we get the 275 gallon tank and just switch it over later on.

Carol Wheeler, 64 Cayuga Ave. commented that as the Mayor and Council are aware, Cayuga Avenue suffered extensive damage in the December storm due to the flooding and she wondered if there was anything being done for the residents, to the street, to help us with if we ever have another storm like that one, to which Mayor Cavanagh asked her exactly what she means by something being done.

Mrs. Wheeler stated that she had read in the Atlanticville that the Council was considering trying to get an emergency phone system for Gooseneck Point residents and possibly raising of the street of Gooseneck Point and she continued that this evening Councilman Wolfe reported on some streams being cleaned out which needs be done near Cayuga.

Mayor Cavanagh explained to Mrs. Wheeler that the telephone system is essentially developed by Councilman Terra and the residents who live on Gooseneck Point and is a private system and he would certainly recommend that she get together with her neighbors on Cayuga and set up a similar system and advised that she get together with Councilman Terra and give him the initial phone number of the first call, they will incorporate that number into their system.

Councilman Terra stated if Mrs. Wheeler does get a group together, they will certainly place the number she gives on the phone call system and he commented that Mr. Broege is very good at watching the tides and keeping in contact with Manasquan and Atlantic Highlands and we are hoping that with his knowledge and research, we can have perhaps a 4-6 hour warning when there is going to be severe weather.

Mayor Cavanagh stated with regard to her comments about raising the street on Gooseneck Point, he explained there are no formal plans at this time to raise that street, but we were asked to consider that as an alternative and he stated that this was not suggested as a method of eliminating flooding, but to eliminate possibly the regular flooding that occurs there where Gooseneck Point becomes cut off because the entrance/exit is under water. Mayor Cavanagh stated that on Cayuga it is

not the same type of problem and also stated that we are requesting flappers be installed on the pipes to keep the water from coming back through the drains and he is not sure if that would be helpful on Cayuga because it is the tide that comes up and over the bulkheads that appears to be the biggest problem

Mrs. Wheeler stated that the water also does come back up through the storm drains on Cayuga and Mayor Cavanagh asked the Clerk to advise the Engineer to take a look at this and see if the flappers could also be used on Cayuga for the same purpose.

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Mrs. Wheeler stated that she came here this evening because all she had read in the newspapers is only about Gooseneck Point and she just wanted to remind the Council about the residents on Cayuga Avenue and that they need some help as well, since they have lost four homes on that street and many of the neighbors have yet to move back into the homes that have remained.

Mayor Cavanagh stated he was aware of the problems on Cayuga because he was there the day of the storm and he commented to Mrs. Wheeler that the main reason that she has been reading about Gooseneck because the residents have been in to speak with us and we would do the same if the residents of Cayuga wanted to come in and he also stated that in his opinion, after the storm, Cayuga was one of the first streets to be cleaned up over any of the other streets in town.

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Mrs. Wheeler agreed and stated she was very appreciative of the Council's efforts with the storm and she has been trying to get her neighbors together to form an interested group and she was the spokesperson at the present time for the residents on Cayuga.

Mrs. Wheeler also stated after the Mayor's report on the Fort Monmouth situation, she wanted them to know that she is an employee in the CECOM building and was glad to see that the Mayor was trying to do something about this matter.

Mayor Cavanagh stated he did not know if there was anything he and the interested officials will be able to do, but obviously we are all feeling that people are being treated in a very difficult way and it is not like someone from here is being transferred to Delaware, which is a hour or so away.

Councilman Wolfe pointed out to Mrs. Wheeler that the two drainage channels on the east and west side of Cayuga are included in the list given and approved to be cleaned out by the County Mosquito Commission.

As no one else from the public wished to be heard, Mayor Cavanagh closed the public portion of the meeting.

Councilman Wolfe moved to correct the Voucher Register which contains a double entry for C. Caruso Excavating Co. Inc. and appears twice on the Register. It was seconded by Councilman Terra and unanimously approved by Council.

Councilman Clark moved to approve the bills as listed on the Voucher Register dated March 18, 1993. It was seconded by councilman Terra and approved by Council with the exceptions of Councilmen Clark and Terra who

voted to abstain from the vouchers due Ed Brister and Councilman Wolfe who abstained from voting on the bills due Haggerty & Sons. TOTAL 1992 VOUCHERS PAID THIS MEETING \$7,062.53.
