

REGULAR MINUTES

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Oceanport, New Jersey
July 15, 1993

REGULAR MEETING: The regular meeting of the Oceanport Mayor and Council was held on July 15, 1993 at 8:00 P.M.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Councilpersons Terra, Filippone, Miller, Taylor, Wolfe and Mayor Cavanagh.

MEMBERS ABSENT: Councilman Clark.

OFFICIALS PRESENT: Borough Clerk, Patricia L. Varca and Borough Attorney, Francis A. Margalotti.

As copies of the minutes from the Regular Meeting held on June 17 and the Special Meeting held on July 6, 1993 were submitted for review by the Governing Body, Councilman Terra moved to waive the reading of same and approve the minutes as presented by the Borough Clerk. It was seconded by Councilman Miller and approved by Council, with the exception of Councilman Wolfe who abstained from voting on the July 6 minutes, since he was not present at that meeting.

CLERK'S REPORTS:

1. Police report for the month of JUNE, 1993 and a copy will be posted on the bulletin board.
2. Resolution approving the person to person transfer from Oceanport Wines & Liquors, Inc. to Oceanport Spirits, Inc.

The Clerk advised that she had a copy of the Affidavit of Publication showing the required notice had been advertised on June 30 and July 7, 1993 and her office had received no inquiries in this regard. She also reported for the record that the Police Department investigation had shown no reason not to approve the transfer.

The Clerk than read resolution **R-93-43** regarding the person to person transfer, after which Councilman Terra moved to approve same. It was seconded by Councilwoman Filippone and approved by Council. **R-93-43**

3. Raffle license application made by the Monmouth Park Charity Fund, Inc. to be held on 9/5/93, 50/50 cash raffle.

The Clerk advised that the paperwork was found to be in order and the required fees had been paid, after which Councilwoman Filippone moved to approve same. It was seconded by Councilman Miller and approved by Council.

COUNCILMAN TERRA: Councilman Terra called for the second reading and public hearing of an ordinance regarding the Interlocal Services Agreement with Monmouth County and asked the Clerk to read the Affidavit of Publication and the proposed ordinance by title only as follows: **AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND MUNICIPAL CLERK TO EXECUTE AN AGREEMENT WITH MONMOUTH COUNTY FOR COOPERATIVE PARTICIPATION IN THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM PURSUANT TO THE INTERLOCAL SERVICES ACT.**

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Mayor Cavanagh opened the meeting to the public for any comments on this subject only.

As no one from the public wished to be heard, Councilman Terra moved to close the public hearing on this subject. It was seconded by Councilwoman Filippone and approved by Council.

Councilman Terra then moved to adopt this ordinance on second and final reading and to advertise same in accordance with law. It was seconded by Councilman Taylor.

The Clerk called the roll:

ORD. # 637 Councilman Terra called for the second reading and public hearing of an ordinance regarding political signs and he asked the Clerk to read the Affidavit of Publication and the proposed ordinance by title only as follows: **AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE PLACEMENT OF POLITICAL SIGNS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.**

Mayor Cavanagh then opened the meeting to the public for any comments they might care to make on this subject only.

As no one from the public wished to be heard, Councilman Terra moved to close the public hearing. It was seconded by Councilwoman Filippone and approved by Council.

Councilman Terra then moved to adopt this ordinance on second and final reading and to advertise same in accordance with law. It was seconded by Councilwoman Filippone.

The Clerk called the roll:

AYES: Councilpersons Terra, Filippone, Miller & Taylor.
NAYS: NONE.
ABSENT: Councilman Clark.
ABSTAIN: Councilman Wolfe.

Councilwoman Filippone stated that she voted yes, but with reluctance because she thinks that this is not beneficial to this town, however, it has been shown that there is cause for a lawsuit if we don't vote in favor of this and she feels in deference to that fact, she has to vote yes.

Councilman Miller echoed Councilwoman Filippone's statement and commented that he voted yes with reservations.

Councilman Taylor also voted yes, but agreed with the statements made by the other Councilpersons and felt the same with regard to this particular ordinance.

Councilman Wolfe stated that this came about basically because the rationale for this ordinance was to keep the aesthetic character of this Borough and with the knowledge that the ordinance would be challenged legally, he had to support the passage, but abstained from voting this ordinance.

Mayor Cavanagh stated for the record, the vote on this ordinance is four ayes, no nays and one abstention. He assumes that everyone in the audience has picked up the hesitancy on the part of the members of the Council regarding the ordinance. He explained that essentially this ordinance deregulates to some degree, the controls which have been in force and effect for approximately 20 years and the concept that the Council, he believed at that time, wished to develop was to isolate the people of Oceanport from being overburdened with the political sign problem that seems to occur at different times during the year. He continued that for aesthetic purposes, we have always had, since that time, essentially a restriction that would allow you, if you wished, to post a political sign in your window or some in your garage, somewhere visible, but not outside and that restriction has been honored for many years by all political parties and all people.

Mayor Cavanagh explained that we have been confronted, since last Fall, with essentially a challenge, although not a lawsuit, but a challenge to that ordinance, which was served upon us in writing and followed up at a Council meeting in October by a resident who felt that legally, the restriction may be too constrictive and that even though we allow the display of a political idea, confining it to an inside window would not comport with, in his opinion, valid and applicable law. Mayor Cavanagh continued that faced with that challenge, the Council has been struggling for several months with the problem of how to resolve the situation and he felt that he speaks for everyone on the dais, when he says that philosophically, there is a desire to continue the orderly and aesthetic appearance that Oceanport keeps all year and especially at these times, however, he thinks that what we are seeing tonight is a vote out of responsibility and duty as opposed to a vote for aesthetics.

Mayor Cavanagh commented so that the wrong idea is not obtained, this is not a relinquishment of the Borough's right to control signs in all ways, but essentially an ordinance that modifies that position with the hope that it would be adjudged to be a legitimate and reasonable restriction and will allow the placing of a singular political sign outside, with certain restrictions as to size, etc. on each property owners land. He stated that he still tends to be hopeful that very few people will select the alternative and he has never yet been disappointed by the good taste of the people of this town.

Mayor Cavanagh ended by saying the Governing Body has done what it has been legally advised in light of the challenge and that is the extent of the vote that was heard this evening.

Councilman Terra then called for the introduction of an amendment to the recycling ordinance and asked the Clerk to read the proposed ordinance by title only as follows: **AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AND SUPPLEMENT AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A MANDATORY PROGRAM FOR RECYCLABLE MATERIALS; CREATING THE POSITION OF RECYCLING COORDINATOR; PROMULGATING RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE SEPARATION, RECOVERY, COLLECTION, STORAGE AND MARKETING OF SAID MATERIAL AND PRESCRIBING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF" PASSED AND APPROVED ON JUNE 18, 1987.**

Councilman Terra moved to approve this ordinance on first reading. It was seconded by Councilman Taylor.

The Clerk called the roll:

AYES: Councilpersons Terra, Filippone, Miller, Taylor & Wolfe.
NAYS: NONE.
ABSENT: Councilman Clark.
ABSTAIN: NONE.

Councilman Terra then moved to hold the public hearing on this ordinance at the next regular meeting scheduled to be held on August 19, 1993 and to advertise same in accordance with law. It was seconded by Councilman Taylor.

The Clerk called the roll:

AYES: Councilpersons Terra, Filippone, Miller, Taylor & Wolfe.
NAYS: NONE.
ABSENT: Councilman Clark.
ABSTAIN: NONE.

Councilman Terra read a letter from the NJ State Safety Council from Carolann Dillon who is the Director, addressed to our Police Chief, Bob Joyce, thanking him for participating in the Council's 1992 Department of the Year Awards Program for police achievement and traffic control and management and in recognition of the fine work of the Oceanport Police Department in promoting highway safety, she enclosed a certificate of commendation.

COUNCILWOMAN FILIPPONE: Councilwoman Filippone congratulated Chief Joyce and his department on the citation just reported by Councilman Terra.

Councilwoman Filippone advised the residents that there were 24 dog licenses issued during the month of June and we have 601 licensed dogs in the Borough, which is less than in the past.

Councilwoman Filippone wanted to mention the up coming marriage of Sharon Walling and she stated that she has enjoyed working with Sharon for the past several years and will miss her. She stated the Borough will also miss her services to the Oceanport First Aid Squad and wished her well and much happiness in her up coming wedding.

Councilwoman Filippone wanted to alert the Borough residents that we will be giving flu shots to residents eighteen years of age and older, for the first time ever as a Borough project, which will take place in October and will cost \$5.00. Councilwoman Filippone explained that we have tried to do this for quite a few years with no success,

due to the fact that we could never get the insurance required to cover the medical personnel, but this year the County has stepped in and they will get the required insurance and she is very pleased to report that this will now be available in the fall.

Mayor Cavanagh commented that it is certainly sad to lose Sharon Walling and she comes from good stock, since her father, Chick Walling, was very active in the First Aid Squad and their volunteer functions and Sharon has been equally active and has been a tremendous force for volunteerism in this town. Mayor Cavanagh noted for the record, the Governing Body while wishing her every happiness on her marriage, hope that perhaps she will return to live in the Borough.

COUNCILMAN MILLER: Councilman Miller reported that the tennis court lights at Blackberry Bay Park status is that the equipment we are waiting for will be delivered within the next two weeks and once the parts are delivered, it will be several days in the repair process. He advised that in the interim Public Works employees have been replacing the bulbs wherever then can find a working socket and asked that everyone just be patient.

Councilman Miller advised that the resurfacing of the basketball courts at Trinity Park and the Community Center will be done in the near future and bids should be received shortly.

Councilman Miller commented that the Public Works Department have been doing a really great job on the parks maintenance and the parks are looking very good. Councilman Miller also wanted to especially thank Tony Cuppari, in the Public Works Department, for the beautiful job he did planting the flowers in front of the Borough Hall.

Councilman Miller advised that funding is needed for the fireworks for Summer's End Festival and urged all residents to send in their donations. He also commented that this year it will be held on Sunday, September 12, 1993 and the Army Band will play again this year as well as food vendors, tail gating, balloons, etc.

Councilman Miller reported under the Water Watch/Waterways Committees and the Monmouth County Board of Health the status of the Shrewsbury River and commented that before going any further, he wanted to thank, with deepest appreciation, the Charles E. and Joyce C. Petino's Foundation, which is a philanthropic group from North Jersey, who has awarded the Oceanport Water Watch Committee, through the Littoral Society, a grant of \$3,900 to expand our operation which will allow us to purchase more precise sampling equipment. He also advised that they have received a \$100 donation from the Monmouth Beach Environmental Commission and thank them for that and also, he wanted to thank Councilman Taylor who has donated \$800 from the Clean Communities grant for the Charles Park clean up project. Councilman Miller hoped that with these recent funds, the Committee may be able to purchase a shallow water boat and motor which will allow them to get up into some of the tributaries and do more monitoring in other areas of the Shrewsbury River.

Councilman Miller advised that since our last meeting in June, the Monmouth County Board of Health water sampling results from Monmouth Park came in, which are from catch basins that are directly in-between the macadam area of the stables, so these numbers are going to be high as far as coliform is concerned. He continued that they lead into outfall pipes that go into Turtle Mews Creek, so those will be high as well. Councilman Miller commented that the numbers went from 300 on the other side of the Oceanport Avenue bridge, to 160,000 within a catch basin; 90,000 at another catch basin; 50,000 at an outfall pipe; 160,000 at another outfall pipe and then they begin to drop off because we get closer to the railroad bridge at Casa Comida-1,400 and then finally 110 at the bridge, at this point it is safe to swim, since the number is under 200 colonies.

Councilman Miller stated when they put these together with the May results, we contacted the Monmouth County Board of Health, people from DEPE, Councilman Taylor who is the liaison to the Environmental Commission, two members of our Board of Health and took a walk through the track to see how their best management practices were holding up and there were several items that we saw that could be worked on and he stated that the cooperation from Sen. VanWagner and his group at the track was very congenial and we have no problem setting up a walk through any time we want to see what is happening.

Councilman Miller reported that on Saturday, June 19 the Water Watch Committee went out and sampled their six sites in the Shrewsbury and there had been no rain. He stated the other side of the bridge was probably one of the lowest numbers with 4 and the highest was at Troutman's Creek and Branchport Creek, which were about 65 and he stated you must keep in mind that the weather has an effect on the results, since it was still dry. He continued on June 22 our Waterways Committee goes out following two nights of heavy rain and sample in the Branchport Creek and the first four sites all the way down to the Pleasure Bay Bridge were all in excess of 1,600, which means they could have been much higher, because the County does not do greater dilution's and the pollution

signs were posted at the two bridges, the marinas, Itaska Place and down at the end of Smith St. He commented that we would rather be on the conservative side by posting the signs and hope that the people will react to them and not swim in those particular areas.

Councilman Miller reported that on June 30 he and Councilman Taylor attended the Monmouth County Environmental Round Table meeting in Freehold and basically they discussed watershed management. He stated that in addition, he met with Martin Beirbaum who is an Administrator in the Office of Land and Water Planning for DEPE and he was able to advise him that hopefully, the DEPE permit which will allow the track to put in their million and one half plus self contained project that would pretty much clear up all the point source problems in Branchport Creek, should be let in August and we are hoping that it happens. He continued that 60 days after that the bids can go out and begin work in the fall and be completed by the following summer. Councilman Miller also came away from this meeting with the idea to video the land surrounding the river, which would help us to pinpoint point and non-point source pollution in addition to Monmouth Park.

Councilman Miller stated on July 3 the Waterways Committee went out and did their sampling, which was after rain, and the coliform counts from the six sites beginning west of the bridge and going around to Troutman's Creek and Branchport Creek, were up, but still below 200 in the main part of the river, however on the down side, the dissolved oxygen was low and the phosphate and nitrate numbers were high, which is not good. He stated that some of this comes from organic break down of materials in our storm drains or from run off of fertilizers from our residents who are not doing what we are asking like cutting the grass and leaving it and not using a lot of fertilizers.

Councilman Miller explained that what we do is report what we find and try and educate our citizens.

Councilman Miller reported on the final results which are from this past Tuesday when the Water Watch Committee took samples and reminded everyone that the weather has again been very dry up until last night. He stated that all of the sites in the Branchport area except at the Casa Comida bridge where it was 500 and is still high, so the signs will remain up, but every other site was below 100, so he is proposing to leave the signs up at Casa Comida bridge and take the other signs down, temporarily and if the numbers come back up this Saturday, after the rain we have just had, the signs will be back up.

Mayor Cavanagh commented that the only realistic long term solution that will make a difference is the closed system because it will take the coliform out of the catch basin and cut it off from the river, so again we are still waiting for DEPE to grant the permit, to allow Monmouth Park to begin construction, which has been pending since January of this year and hopefully it will be released this August.

COUNCILMAN TAYLOR: Councilman Taylor reported under recycling that there is a trailer near the newspaper trailers for telephone books, which will be there until July 31, 1993. He also requested that residents not place the phone books in with the junk mail container and he also wanted to thank the Public Works employees for getting the trailer over to the recycling area.

Councilman Taylor reminded the residents that as of September 1, asphalt roofing shingles will not be picked up by the garbage contractor and must be recycled. He advised any residents who plan to have roof work done, to make sure their contractor will be responsible for disposing properly of the shingles.

Councilman Taylor reported under Drug Alliance, they have just submitted paperwork for their 1994 funding and they are looking for \$5,200 in 1994 and stated they want to continue the Center State trips for Wolfhill and Maple Place Schools as well as the BABES Program and Project Youths that we have at Shore Regional. He stated they are also looking at two new items one will be the Drug Fair that will be conducted in conjunction with the Sophomore Carnival and the Drug Alliances from surrounding municipalities will come and hand out pamphlets and we are looking for a speaker to talk with seniors regarding drug and alcohol abuse.

COUNCILMAN WOLFE: Councilman Wolfe asked the Clerk to read resolution **R-93-44** extending the grace period for 3rd quarter, 1993 taxes to August 31, 1993, after which he moved to approve same. It was seconded by Councilman Miller and approved by Council.

Councilman Wolfe then moved to authorize the Mayor and Municipal Clerk to sign a Restrictive Covenant regarding the subdivision known as Block 177, Lots 16.01, 17.01, 17.02, 19.01 - 19.16. It was seconded by Councilman Taylor and approved by Council.

Councilman Wolfe commended Councilman Miller and his Water Watch Committee for being the recipient of the grant he spoke of earlier this evening and hopefully that will be the start for additional grants for this Committee.

Councilman Wolfe reminded any residents who are placing branches at the curb that they must be tied and bundled, not to exceed six feet in length and 2-3 feet in diameter, at which point the garbage contractor will take them with the regular trash. He stated he has noticed some isolated properties where this is happening, the rest of the Borough really is in good condition.

Councilman Wolfe advised that the parks are looking very well and with the exception of some minor plantings that will be done once this dry period is over. He also advised that the vandalism which was done to the basketball court at Charles Park after the December storm, had gone out for quotes, which came back much too high and the Public works employees took on that project and they painted the surface and the courts are now in good shape.

Councilman Wolfe moved to temporarily appoint Councilman Miller to the Finance Committee in the absence of Councilman Clark, for the purpose of signing the vouchers. It was seconded by councilman Terra and approved by Council.

MAYOR CAVANAGH: NO REPORT.

Mayor Cavanagh then opened the meeting to the public for any comments and/or questions they might care to make.

PETITIONS FROM THE PUBLIC:

Mrs. Jean Pagels, 161 Monmouth Blvd. stated she and her husband have been residents of the Borough for the past three years and are very happy here. She stated she and her husband are here tonight representing themselves and their two children and several of their immediate neighbors and the Borough as well. Mrs. Pagels explained that they are asking for consideration and passage of an ordinance related to the prohibiting the feeding of migratory wild fowl in our area and commented that before coming to the Council, they have researched this matter on County, State and Federal levels to make sure they are correct with the information they have brought with them this evening.

Mrs. Pagels explained that she also prepared a summary of what they felt the problem was from a personal point of view as well as it relates to the literature they have received. Mrs. Pagels commented that geese are naturally migratory birds, but considerable numbers of geese are way laid from their passage by feeding, which is an unnatural condition for them, but a very appealing one. She further stated that this feeding interrupts their migratory passage and causes the geese to become year round residents in an area midway of their journey, which is where Oceanport is. Mrs. Pagels stated that geese become quickly used to humans being around them and problems develop when the numbers increase, since young geese return to their nesting areas year after year to raise their babies and it results in unsanitary and depleted lawns; undesirable accumulation of droppings and feathers, fouling of local waters, swimming facilities, beaches, lawns, parks, etc. and once geese are established in a particular area they refuse to leave and become dependent on handouts and stop seeking food on their own.

Mrs. Pagels pointed out that most people feed these types of water fowl bread and bread has been shown to cause young geese to develop deformed wings and not be able to fly. Mrs. Pagels stated that the birds have become a nuisance to them and some of their neighbors and it also causes disputes in the neighborhood, since one section wants to feed the geese and the other side does not want the geese around on properties. She explained that their property backs up to Blackberry Bay Park and the geese come right up on the lawn and graze within 10 feet of the back door and they are quite aggressive to her young children. She stated when she approached some of the neighbors who were feeding the geese, they outright refused and ignored the literature she had supplied for them.

Mrs. Pagels commented that she can no longer leave her young children in the back yard to play, since the geese have approached her children, hissing at them and more importantly, the yard is covered with geese droppings, which they clean up on an average of three times a day, using a snow shovel and she is concerned about the bacteria that she is aware of contained in these droppings. Mrs. Pagels stated that when they moved in there was one goose; the next year there were three and now there are nine, because they have been having babies and she felt that next year there might be fifty.

Mrs. Pagels proposed that the Council adopt an ordinance which will prohibit the feeding as well as the creation of conditions which are encouraging animals to come up onto the properties. She has found that there are ordinances such as she is proposing in both New Jersey and New York and hoped the Council would consider their request.

Mr. Margalotti, Borough Attorney asked if they had given any consideration to either the application or enforceability of this type of ordinance, where the Council would enact something that would pertain to private property, since you have private individuals in the privacy of their own backyards, putting out feed and might intend some of the feed for other birds and wildlife and along the way, the migratory fowl availed themselves to the food. He also questioned if they had given any thought to the problem the Borough would have in enforcing such an ordinance, since it is only as good as it can be enforced.

Mrs. Pagels commented that she sees the passage of this type of ordinance as some type of a deterrent so that when she goes to her neighbors, she has some legal backing since she feels when she is explaining the situation to her neighbors, it does not carry any weight and she has been told by them that they love the geese and plan to continue to feed them.

Councilwoman Filippone commented that she agrees with what Mrs. Pagels said but she also realizes that it is a very difficult matter to enforce and continued that her daughter lives on the lake in West Long Branch and she watches people come to the area with huge bags of bread and stand right under the sign that says "Save the Lake, please do not feed the geese. Fine \$200.00" and they do not care and it is totally ineffective and they have even spoken to the Police who state it is very difficult because you have to be there all the time and she pointed out that this is a public park and can imagine it would be next to impossible on private property.

Councilwoman Filippone also agreed that the droppings are everywhere and causes a terrible mess.

Councilman Miller asked if Mrs. Pagels had a copy of a sample ordinance from another town, to which she stated in the documents she just presented to the Mayor had a sample ordinance included.

Mr. Cartwright, River Street commented that he lives across the river from the Anfuso property and one morning he counted 150 Canadian Geese on their property and this was several years ago and he did not have any geese on his property because he had a dog at that time and when the dog was out he would chase the geese off the property.

Mayor Cavanagh commented that in principal he understands what Mrs. Pagels is saying and it makes sense, but we have the private/public concept which our Borough Attorney has already touched on briefly, as to whether or not we can regulate private property and that would have to be researched; secondly the enforcement of such an ordinance would be a nightmare, since he cannot envision how we would have this done and who would enforce this type of regulation. Mayor Cavanagh asked Mrs. Pagels if she has spoken with the County Board of Health to see if there are any other towns around who have a similar ordinance, to which Mrs. Pagels stated West Long Branch was the only one she knew of at this point.

Mayor Cavanagh stated we will reach out to the Monmouth County Board of Health and find out what type of experience they have had in this area and what their recommendations are regarding this matter as well as contacting the NJ League of Municipalities and requesting copies of samples ordinances.

Mr. Margalotti questioned why the geese are attracted on to Mrs. Pagels property, since she does not feed them to which she stated that the yards are open to each other and she does not have any bulkheading, so they come up through the reeds onto the shallow beach area and then onto the lawn to graze. She commented that the residents who have bulkheading do not seem to have this problem, because the geese like to land in the shallow water and then walk up onto the land.

Mr. Margalotti asked if Mrs. Pagels could help her situation by installing some type of fencing, which she stated they are doing at the present time, but that makes them prisoners in their own yard, since her young children can no longer walk down to the waters edge and play in the sand, which does not seem fair.

Mr. Pagels commented that they realize the fence at this point in time would be a good idea especially since the geese are molting right now and are unable to fly, but again, within a month or so when their feathers return, they will be able to just fly into our yard, if that is what they want to do.

Councilwoman Filippone commented that there is a Board of Health meeting scheduled for next week and she will bring up this matter to the Board and see if the members have any recommendations or advise regarding this situation.

Mayor Cavanagh stated he cannot promise Mr. & Mrs. Pagels that if they come to the next Council meeting we are going to be able to introduce an ordinance, as they requested, but he assured them the Governing Body will certainly look into this matter and try and find some realistic solution to their problem and he appreciated them coming out tonight.

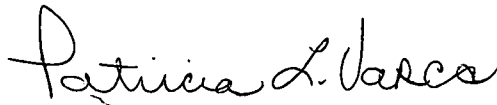
Councilwoman Filippone pointed out that one of the problems she envisions is not only the feeding of the geese, but the feeding of the squirrels as well, because we are over run with squirrels and she felt once we begin talking about the migratory animals, the public is going to want to know what can be done about the squirrels.

As no one else from the public wished to be heard, Mayor Cavanagh closed the public portion of the meeting.

Councilman Wolfe moved to approve the bills as listed on the Voucher Register dated July 15, 1993. It was seconded by Councilman Terra and approved by Council, with the exception of Councilman Miller abstaining from a bill to himself for reimbursement and Councilman Wolfe who abstained from voting on the vouchers from Clayton Block Co., Inc.
